<mark>Growing in Christ : Getting Read</mark>y for School

Of all the apostles in the New Testament, the Apostle Paul gave the best example of how to teach others. Not only did he write the basic religious instruction and beliefs of the young church for others to understand, he tutored those who aspired to spread the Christian faith.

In Paul's letter to the Romans, Romans 13, he mentioned Phoebe, a deacon, who he had instructed. In the same chapter, he mentioned Priscilla and Aquila, referring them as his co-workers in Christ Jesus and Andronicus and Junia, converted Jews who Paul had instructed. Paul then writes a long list of followers who he had taught, including Timothy, his apprentice, and Tertius, his secretary who wrote the words in the Book of Romans that Paul had spoken. With these letters, followers in Rome could read Paul's correspondence to the new churches and members could learn from them. From this passage, we see that Paul taught a diverse group of students, Greeks and Jews, males and females. Paul's other books in the New Testament, from Corinthians to Philemon, he offers instructions to fellow believers.

From Paul's letters we understand the important elements of a good teacher and students.

- Write down all that your teacher communicates to you. Paul received inspiration from God and Jesus Christ and he preserved them by writing his New Testament books.
- Repeat what you have learned to others. By dictating what God had spoken to him and having Tertius write them down, he reinforced his understanding.
- Write so that many audiences can understand. Paul, a Turk from Tarsus, as the primary missionary of the early church, preached and taught Jews, Greeks, Romans, Cypriots, Cretans, Sicilian, and others.

In this newsletter, we hope to use what Paul has taught to improve the learning of children at New Hope and any child who reads this Newsletter so they can better understand God's Word.

Preparing for School: Learning from Apostle Paul

The Apostle Paul's Methods of Learning

1. Sit with the best students in the class

The Apostle Paul turned from a persecutor of Christians to a believer. By joining the members of the class who excel, you show that you want to excel too. This applies not only to school but also to church, to work, and to sports.

2. Write down everything that your teacher says on the subject you are learning.

Studies have shown that physically writing what we hear aids retention of the information. Even elementary students can write what their teacher has taught them. The Apostle Paul wrote most of the New Testament. He wanted to retain what God had instructed him, to teach others, and keep a record of all that he had learned.

- **3. Read the notes that you have taken every evening.** Ask yourself questions about the notes, such as, "What are the key ideas? What are some examples? How do these relate to what I already know?"
- 4. **Explain what you have learned to others**, such as your mother, sibling, or friend. Just as the Apostle Paul constantly instructed on his journeys, we should follow him and communicate what we have learned to others. By talking, we sense what we really know and what we need to review.
- **5.** Use free time to improve. Although the Apostle Paul found himself in jail, he continued to write down his inspirations from God. If riding in a car or bus, between classes, waiting for a friend, take the time to read the assigned book, to figure out a math problem, or to learn spelling words.
